We- the partners of the Tonga Schools Network - have prepared this booklet with you - the parents - in mind.






A FEW WORDS

What is a good communication and why is it important?

A good communication is a communication where every actor involved in it is being heard, where you can give your voice and where the interactions are in a language that everybody understand.



Good communication with the school stakeholders is important as it will help your children feel happy going to school. It will put them in confidence and they will then be in a better position to improve their abilities and be more successful academically.



What does it mean to get engaged with the school?

It implies to follow up the children's homework, to keep in touch with the teachers, to take part in the activities at the school (Bendixen, Danielsen, 2020). It involves all your contribution to your child formal education.

This manual is here to help you and thus help your children to get the best out of school and formal education.
















DO I KNOW WHAT THE SCHOOL EXPECTS FROM MY CHILDREN?



School can be challenging for your children, because it is rigid and formal; there are also many rules to follow and understand. It is important as a parent that you get to know what the school expect from your children, so that you can explain it to them.

Do you know the rules of the school, so that you can explain them to your children?



You may ask the school secretary or a teacher to give you the rules of the school.

Here are small of the rules and expectation that are expected from children:

Stay sitting and ask when you want to move or go to the toilet

Listen to the teacher and do not talk all the time

Go to school everyday

Help with the homework they are given

DO YOU KNOW THAT YOU CAN GET INVOLVED IN THE SCHOOL?



The research has proven that **parental involvement is key to the success of the children.** whatever the socioeconomic background.

Great things happen when parents get involved.

What will your involvement do to your children? Your involvement in the school will influence the achievement of your children.

What is the difference between parental engagement and parental involvement?

Parental involvement is a first step. Helping your children with homework, attending school meetings, school festivities, volunteering when help is being asked.

Parental engagement is going further and it is when school and home act as a team.

When there is parental involvement, the grades get higher, the children develop self-confidence; the children have better social skills and classroom behaviour.

In your child's education


- 1. establish routines* for learning

HOW CAN I GET INVOLVED?



Both for you and for your children it is important to get involved in the school your children are going to.

Being involved does not mean taking the place of the teacher, but rather collaborating with him/her.

There are several ways of collaborating and letting your voice be heard.

The more you are interested and collaborating with the school, the better your children will feel when attending school, the happier he/she will be and this will help them to be successful.

The association groups together a number of parents who have been democratically elected to represent them and be an advocate of the families to the school - see our video on the topic on the Tonga website.

Parents' Café are informal meetings of parents where you can exchange on the topic of the school.

In which language is the communication done?


If the communication is done in the school language and you do not master it well, this could be difficult and you may wish to use tools to help you or ask someone to translate for you.

Your children should not translate for you, especially when you you talk about his/ her performance at school - try to find someone neutral.

Depending on the questions you have, it could be the secretary or even the teacher, try to find out thought the Parents' Café or the Parents' Association, whom to address your questions. Feel free to ask for an independent translator if it helps


Why should you communicate with the teacher?

COMMUNICATION WITH THE TEACHER



When you are going to talk with the teacher of child, it is better to get yourself ready.

How can you do that?

Make an appointment

Organise what your wish to say - you can even have it written down on paper

Communicate effectively

Be open, positive and do not hesitate to ask questions

Meeting with the teacher is beneficial for your child

PARENTS' ASSOCIATION



Did you know that in most of the schools there is what is called a Parents' Association - also called Parents-Teachers' Association?

As a parent, you can take part to this Association as it will allow you to understand how the school is working and what is happening in the school. It is a place where you can meet other parents and get to know people in the community.

How can you be involved? This group of people are set up as an association and thus there are a number of people elected every year who represent the parents and act as their voice to the school.

The parents' association has two main interests:

- moral interest: concerning the way children are treated in the school, make sure that the children are in security in the school, etc..
- material interest: check that the buildings are safe, check the price of the meals at school and that every child can have access, etc...

PARENTS' CAFÉ



Do you know what a Parents Café is?

A Parents' Café is an informal gathering of parents who are meeting to talk about the experiences with the school. They can ask their questions to other parents, and sometimes a teacher can be present to help them and answer questions.

The Parents' Café is not taking the role of the Parents' Association, It has a different aim. It will give you the possibility to meet with other parents on a regular basis and will help you feel being part of the school community.
